

Sarah Hughes was a highly respected *Guardian* and *Observer* journalist, who died from breast cancer on the 5th April 2021. Sarah's work ranged from hard-hitting and acclaimed overseas reportage, to sport journalism, television and entertainment writing, and lifestyle journalism.

In 2004, she was shortlisted for an Amnesty International award for her reports with photojournalist Kate Holt on abuses by UN peacekeepers in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC).

Her book Holding Tight, Letting Go: My Life, Death And All The Madness In Between, was published in 2022.
