The Keats Foundation Annual Lecture 2016

R. S. White (*The University of Western Australia and Australian Research Council Centre of Excellence for the History of Emotions 1100-1800*) presented the Keats Foundation Annual Lecture 2016 on 6 September 2016 at Keats House, Hampstead, London. His title was "'Ethereal Finger-Pointings": Associative Memories and Keats's Shakespearean Quotations', and his lecture ranged

widely over concepts of memory, Keats's creative response to his 'presider' Shakespeare in poems and letters, and his reflections on his own creativity and Shakespeare's.

Bob focused on some 'enchanted phrases' in one of Keats's letters, in particular 'voyage of conception' and 'ethereal finger-pointings', both leading towards Shakespeare. He explored a critically neglected but important cluster of subjects for many Romantics, the association of ideas, the art of memory, and creative intertextuality between writers – in this case Keats and Shakespeare. He revealed how Keats developed a theory of the associative memory and actually demonstrated it in operation, using Shakespeare and in particular *The Tempest* as the running link.

Some forty Keatsians attended the lecture, and the lively question session (which ran over time) and glasses of white wine completed a stimulating and memorable evening.

Fourth John Keats Bicentenary Conference at Keats House, Hampstead, 19-21 May 2017. John Keats, 1817: Moments, Meetings, and the Making of a Poet

The Keats Foundation's bicentennial Keats Conference for 2017 will be from Friday 19 – Sunday 21 May 2017 at Keats House, Hampstead, London.

So many important things happened in 1817 for John Keats, from his decision to quit medicine and the momentous publication of *Poems* to his seeing the Elgin Marbles, meeting Isabella Jones, writing his 'Negative Capability' letter and finishing *Endymion* just as the first of *Blackwood's* attacks on the 'Cockney School' began.

As 1817 drew to a close Keats was at the 'Immortal Dinner' in Haydon's painting room. This was the year when so much was put in motion for Keats's later writings and literary relationships.

Papers will be welcomed on any aspect of Keats's writings, life and literary relationships in 1817 and beyond. A bicentenary focus 1817-2017 would be helpful, but all paper proposals on John Keats will be welcomed. The formal Call for Papers will be issued later in the autumn of this year.

The 2017 Keats Bicentenary Diary

Peter Phillips (who has given papers at each of the Foundation's Keats Bicentenary Conferences) has produced a *John Keats Bicentenary Diary* for 2017. Each week of 2017 has the dates and space for diary entries (as you'd expect) on the right-hand page. Facing it is the equivalent week in 1817, with information about Keats's activities and an extract from what he was writing at the time. The diary is A5 hardback with 126 pages.
